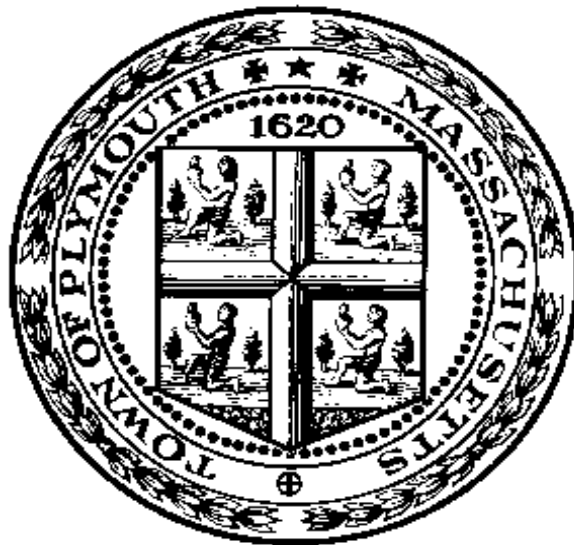

Article 6: Mr. Canty moved that the Town appropriate \$185,000 to pay costs associated with conducting a Town-Wide Fire Department and Fire Station Feasibility and Facilities Study and all other costs incidental and related thereto, and to meet this appropriation transfer such sum of money from free cash.

Article 7: Mr. Canty moved that the Town vote to establish a Special Purpose Stabilization Fund for Facility Capital Maintenance, as authorized by the provisions of G.L. c.40, §5B, for capital maintenance of Town-owned buildings, which fund shall be under the care and custody of the Town Treasurer, and further, to transfer the sum of \$2,500,000 from Free Cash for the purpose of funding said Stabilization Fund for Facility Capital Maintenance.

Town Meeting Vote: Motion Carried, 111-8-0.

Article 8: Mr. Canty moved that the Town vote to amend the language of Article 9A10, consistent with the vote taken at the August 10, 2020 Town Meeting, the sum of \$247,100 from Free Cash to be expended under the direction of The Town of Plymouth Building Committee for design and engineering for the replacement of roofs at three Plymouth Public Schools. This phase of the project would determine the scope of the project including evaluating each school to determine order of replacement, material selection, preparation of drawings and bid documents, and develop project cost estimates and project timelines. The three schools are Federal Furnace Elementary school located at 860 Federal Furnace Road, Plymouth, Massachusetts, 02360; West Elementary School located at 170 Plympton Road, Plymouth, Massachusetts; and Indian Brook Elementary School located at 1181 State Road, Plymouth, Massachusetts 02360 for which feasibility study the Town may be eligible for a grant from the Massachusetts School Building Authority. The MSBA's grant program is a non-entitlement, discretionary program based on need, as determined by the MSBA, and any costs the Town incurs in connection with the feasibility study in excess of any grant approved by and received from the MSBA shall be the sole responsibility of the Town.

Article 9A:

Mr. Canty moved that the Town appropriate the sum of \$4,771,630 to pay costs of various capital projects listed as A1 through A32 in the Motion 9 of the 2021 Annual Town Meeting Warrant as set forth in the Report & Recommendations of the Advisory & Finance Committee, as shown below, and for the payment of all costs incidental or related thereto, and that to meet this appropriation \$3,348,802 shall be transferred from Free Cash, \$105,984 shall be transferred from the Fire Safety Fund, \$10,000 shall be transferred from the Fire Alarm Services Fund, \$280,000 shall be transferred from Sewer Retained Earnings, \$334,938 shall be transferred from the Solid Waste Retained Earnings, \$527,973 shall be transferred from Water Retained Earnings, \$23,933 shall be transferred from Airport Retained Earnings and \$140,000 from Sale of Lots.

Chapter 44, or pursuant to any other enabling authority, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor; that the Treasurer or other Town official, with the approval of the Select Board is authorized to contract for and expend any federal or state aid available for the project, provided that the amount of the authorized borrowing shall be reduced by the amount of such aid received prior to the issuance of bonds or notes under this vote; or to take any other action relative thereto. Any premium received by the Town upon the sale of any bonds or notes approved by this vote, less any premium applied to the payment of the costs of issuance of such bonds and notes, may be applied to the payment of costs approved by this vote in accordance with M.G.L. Chapter 44, Section 20, thereby reducing the amount authorized to be borrowed to pay such costs by a like amount.

Those identified as relating to Council on Aging, including **revenue received as reimbursement from The Friends charity group**

and further by revising Column D: Program or Activity Expenses Payable from Fund in said row to read as follows, with the bold and underlined language inserted therein:

This fund shall be for contractual services and other expenses related to programs for senior citizens **and expenses to include credit card banking fees**

Article 15: Mr. Canty moved that the Town appropriates the sum of \$300,000 to pay costs of repair, replacement and/or upgrade of septic systems, pursuant to agreements between the Board of Health and residential property owners, and for the payment of all costs thereof as defined in Section 1 of Chapter 29C of the General Laws and all costs incidental or related thereto, and that to meet this appropriation, the Treasurer, with the approval of the Select Board, is authorized to borrow said amount under and pursuant to M.G.L. Chapter 44, or pursuant to any other enabling authority, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor; or to take any other action relative thereto. Any premium received by the Town upon the sale of any bonds or notes approved by this vote, less any premium applied to the payment of the costs of issuance of such bonds and notes, may be applied to the payment of costs approved by this vote in accordance with M.G.L. Chapter 44, Section 20, thereby reducing the amount authorized to be borrowed to pay such costs by a like amount.

Article 23: Ms. Kathryn Holmes, Precinct 8, moved that the Town vote to amend the General Bylaws by adding in Chapter 23, Animals, a new Article V, Pet Shop Sales of Dogs, Cats, and Rabbits as follows:

GENERAL BYLAWS OF THE TOWN OF PLYMOUTH

Chapter 23, Animals

Article V, Pet Shop Sales of Dogs, Cats, and Rabbits

§23-28 Definitions.

- (1) “Pet shop” means a brick-and-mortar retail establishment where dogs, cats, or rabbits are sold, exchanged, bartered, or offered for sale as pet animals to the general public at retail. The following entities shall not be considered a “pet shop” for purposes of this section: (1) a public animal control agency or shelter; (2) an animal rescue organization; or (3) a person who sells or otherwise transfers the offspring of animals the person owns and has bred on their residential premises.
- (2) “Sell” means to exchange for consideration, adopt out, barter, auction, trade, lease, or otherwise transfer animals.
- (3) “Offer for sale” means to advertise or otherwise proffer a dog, cat, or rabbit for acceptance by another person.
- (4) “Public animal control agency or shelter” means a facility operated by any locality, for the purpose of impounding seized, stray, homeless, abandoned, unwanted, or surrendered animals, or a facility operated for the same purposes under a written contract with the Town or any other locality.
- (5) “Animal rescue organization” means a not-for-profit organization that has tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code, and registered with the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources, if required, whose mission and practice is, in whole or in significant part, the rescue and placement of animals into permanent homes, and that does not breed animals nor obtain animal in exchange for payment or compensation from any person that breeds or brokers animals.

(6) "Person" means an individual, corporation, partnership, association, or any other legal entity.

(7) "Dog" means any member of the species *Canis familiaris*.

(8) "Cat" means any member of the species *Felis catus*.

(9) "Rabbit" means any member of the species *Oryctolagus cuniculus domesticus*.

§23-29 Sale of dogs, cats, or rabbits prohibited.

(1) It shall be unlawful for a pet shop to sell or offer for sale a dog, cat, or rabbit.

(2) A pet shop may provide space for the display of dogs, cats, or rabbits available for adoption only if:

(i) such animals are displayed and made available for adoption by either: a public animal control agency or shelter or an animal rescue organization, as defined, and

(ii) each pet shop shall maintain records sufficient to document the source of each dog, cat, or rabbit the pet shop displays, for at least one year following the date of acquisition. Such records shall be made available, immediately upon request, to any animal control officer or any duly appointed officer or representative of the Town.

(3) No person shall sell, exchange, trade, barter, lease, or display for a commercial purpose any dog, cat, or rabbit on or in any street, public grounds, commercial or retail parking lot, flea market, or other market, regardless of whether such access is authorized by the property owner, except for a dog, cat, or rabbit displayed:

(i) By a public animal control agency or shelter or an animal rescue organization, as defined; or

(ii) As part of a state or county fair exhibition, 4-H program, or similar exhibitions or educational programs.

§23-30 Penalties.

(1) In addition to any other penalty provided by law, any pet shop that makes a sale or offer for sale of a dog, cat, or rabbit in violation of subsection (b)(1) shall be fined \$300. Each unlawful sale or offer for sale shall constitute a separate violation.

(2) In addition to any other penalty provided by law, a pet shop that makes a provision of space knowingly and in violation of subsection (b)(2) shall be fined \$300. Each unlawful provision of space shall constitute a separate violation.

§23-31 Severability.

If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this bylaw shall be declared invalid for any reason whatsoever, such decision shall not affect the

remaining portions of this bylaw which shall continue in full force and effect, and to this end the provisions of this bylaw are hereby declared to be severable.

§23-32 Effective date.

The provisions of these section shall be effective upon satisfaction of the requirements for Attorney General approval and for posting or publication provided in M.G.L. c. 40 § 32.
