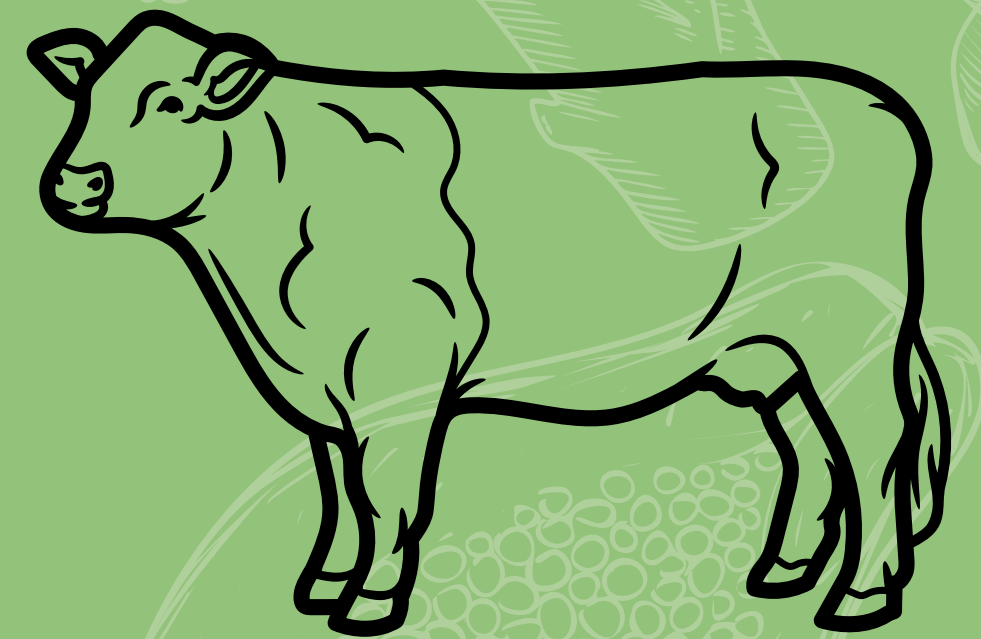


PLY MOUTH FARM AND LIVESTOCK COMPACT



WHAT IS THE LIVESTOCK COMPACT?

The Plymouth Farm and Livestock Compact is a voluntary agreement to manage family and small commercial farms using Best Farming Practices; *in lieu of implementation of additional regulations.*

- Farming with the Compact means:
 - The Compact is an agreement between the Town of Plymouth and individual farmers.
 - The farmer will agree to prepare, sign and farm in accordance with the compact.
 - The farmer will agree to use best farming practices and operate their farms in an ethical, humane, and nurturing manner.
 - The farmer agrees to comply with the 15 stated Compact requirements.
- As long as the farmer is conducting their operation according to the Compact, they are immune to any future nuisance complaints.
- Any farmer who chooses not to participate is free to do so, but they are open to any nuisance complaints.

PLYMOUTH GENERAL BYLAWS:

CHAPTER 63 SECTIONS 1 & 2



THE RIGHT TO FARM BYLAW.. ENCOURAGES THE PURSUIT OF AGRICULTURE, PROMOTES AGRICULTURAL BASED ECONOMIC OPPURTUNITIES, AND PROTECTS FARMING IN THE TOWN OF PLYMOUTH BY ALLOWING AGRICULTURAL USES AND RELATED ACTIVITIES TO FUNCTION IN MINIMAL CONFLICT WITH ABUTTERS AND TOWN AGENCIES. THE BYLAW SHALL APPLY TO ALL JURISDICTIONAL AREAS WITHIN THE TOWN.

The words "farming" and "agriculture" shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

Cultivation of tilling of the soil
Dairying
Production, cultivation, growing and harvesting of any agricultural, aquacultural, floricultural, viticultural, or horticultural commodities
Growing and harvesting of forest products upon forest land, and other forestry and lumbering operations
Raising and keeping of horses
Raising and keeping of livestock including poultry, swine, cattle, ratites (such as emus and ostriches) and camelids (such as llamas and camels) and other domesticated animals for food and other agricultural purses, including bees and furbearing animals.

"Farming" shall encompass activities including but not limited to:
operation and transportation of slow-moving farm equipment over roads within town
control of pests, including but not limited to insects, weeds, predators and diseased organisms of plants and animals
application of manure, fertilizers and pesticides
conducting agricultural-related educational and farm-based recreational activities, including agri-tourism, provided that the activities are related to marketing the agricultural t or services of the farm
processing and packaging of the agricultural output of a Farmers' operation of a farmers' market or farm stand including signage.
Maintenance, repari, or storage of seasonal equipment or aparatus owned or leased by the farm owner or manager used expressly for the purpose of propagation, processing, managment or sale of the agricultural products
On-Farm relocation of earth and the clearing of ground for farming operations.

PLYMOUTH GENERAL BYLAWS:

CHAPTER 63-3

RIGHT TO FARM DECLARATION

The Right to Farm is hereby recognized to exist within the Town of Plymouth.

The above-described agricultural activities may occur on holidays, weekdays and weekends by night or day and shall include the attendant incidental noise, odors, dust, and fumes associated with normally accepted agricultural practices. It is hereby determined that whatever the impact may be caused to others through the normal practice of agriculture is more than offset by the benefits of farming to the neighborhood, community, and society in general.

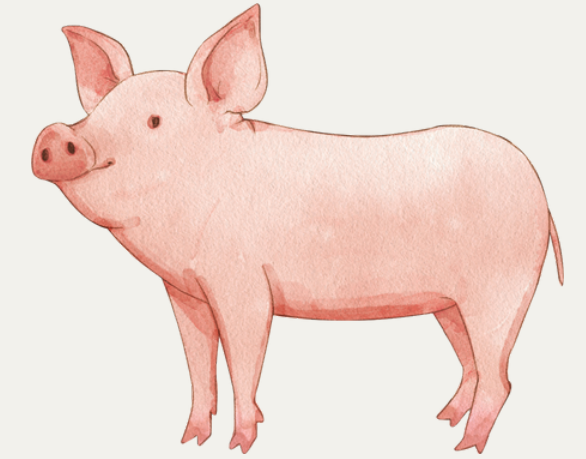

FARM COMPACT: STEPS TO INITIAL ADOPTION



- Read Compact document
- Confirm current livestock operations and comply with Compact Requirements
- Complete compact documentation: Farm and emergency contact information, structures: houses and yards, livestock inventory, schedules: feed, water, health, health management records (bring up to date)
- Begin tracking and documenting operations: feed, water and waste management
- Conduct a farm visit and Farm Compact walkthrough with Agricultural Commissioner
- Address noted issues or questions
- Arrange and conduct Compact sign-off
- Share Compact with Farm staff, service providers (vets), and (optionally) neighbors
